WHY IS IT CELEBRATED?

The International Day of the Girl Child was established on October 11 by Resolution 66/170 of the United Nations General Assembly, which recognized the rights of girls and the difficulties they face globally.

The need to address the issues girls confront, support girls' empowerment, and ensure that their human rights are upheld are all emphasized by the International Day of the Girl Child.

Girls who receive an education can later on pursue meaningful employment and boost their nation's economy.

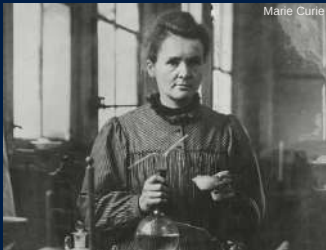
With eight years of education, they are also four times less likely to marry young, which makes them and their families healthier.

Marie Curie (International):

A trailblazing physicist and chemist, she was the first woman to be awarded the Nobel Prize and is the only person to have achieved this feat in the fields of physics & chemistry.



Arundhati Roy (Indian):

An Indian author known for her novel "The God of Small Things", Roy is celebrated for her literary contributions and activism.



Mother Teresa (International):

An Indian-born Roman Catholic nun and missionary, she devoted her life to aiding the underprivileged and sick in Calcutta along with other parts of the world.

Medha Patkar (Indian):

She is well-known for her work with the Narmada Bachao Andolan, which promotes the rights of those impacted by big dams in India. She is a social and environmental activist.

Kalpana Chawla (Indian-American):

Her accomplishments in aerospace engineering and space exploration made her an inspiration. She was the first woman astronaut from India to travel to space.

Malala Yousafzai (International):

Malala Yousafzai, a Pakistani activist and the youngest winner of a Nobel Prize in history, is well known for her support towards women's rights and girls' education



Lata Mangeshkar (Indian):

One of India's most renowned playback singers, Lata Mangeshkar is renowned for her melodic voice and thousands of songs that she has recorded.

Margaret Thatcher (International):

Margaret Thatcher, the first female prime minister of the United Kingdom, was a powerful and well-respected politician recognised for her conservative stances.

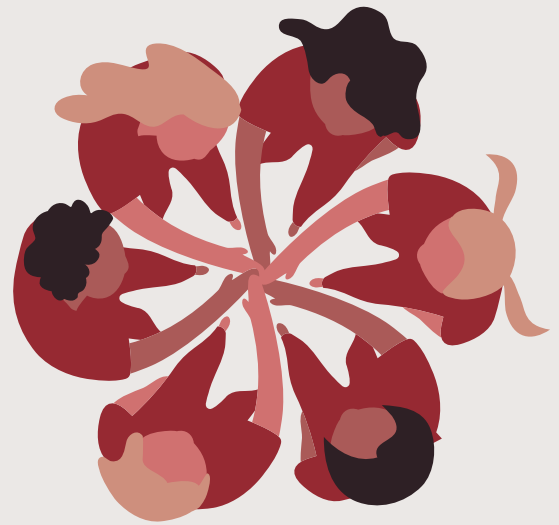


1. Raise Awareness: Through conversations, workshops, and social media, raise awareness about the value of women's and girl's empowerment.
 2. Fight for gender-equal laws and policies in your community, at work, and government by supporting them.
 3. Advocate for equal opportunities for women in all fields, including leadership positions, employment, and education. When you come across prejudice or gender bias, address it.
 4. Financial Empowerment: Encourage female entrepreneurs by making purchases from and investing in firms run by women.
 5. Leadership: Giving girls and women in your community leadership and assistance will help them develop their self-confidence and pursue their ambitions.
 6. Combating Violence Against Women: Be on the lookout for instances of gender-based violence and report them.
 7. Encourage girls to seek careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) areas through promoting education that dispels gender stereotypes. We promote harassment-free, inclusive, and safe learning environments in schools.
 8. Patriarchal Practices: We must try to eradicate patriarchal practices entirely. Men are in a better position than women, whether it be in the sense of dowry or a portion in the property. This makes being a woman challenging overall since one feels extremely burdened.
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PROVISIONS FOR GIRL CHILD AND WOMEN EMPOWERMENT BY THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA

The Indian government has begun a campaign called Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao. It focuses mostly on the clusters in Delhi, Uttar Pradesh, Haryana, Uttarakhand, Punjab, and Bihar.

The Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao (BBBP) program was introduced by Prime Minister Narendra Modi on January 22, 2015. It is a national project co-led by the Ministries of Women and Child Development, Health and Family Welfare, and Education that attempts to address the problem of the decreasing child sex ratio image (CSR).



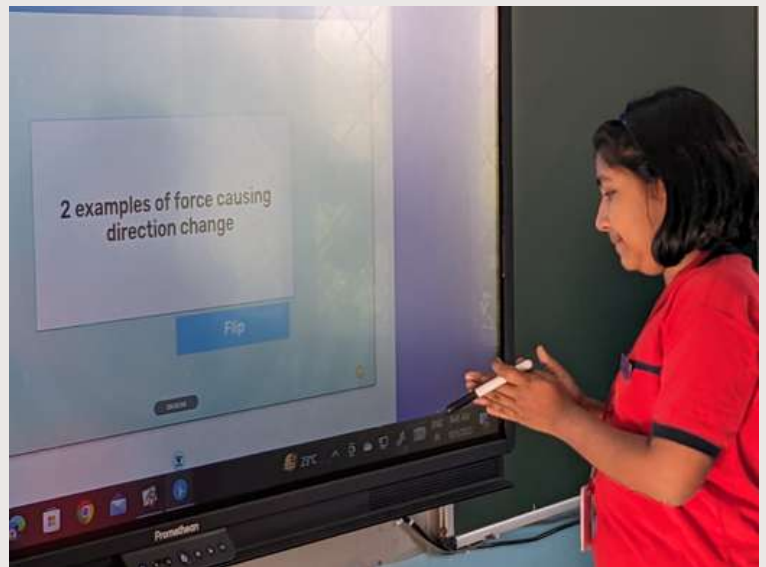
The Swadhar Greh Scheme, which the Ministry of Women and Child Development is putting into action, is intended for women who have been put in difficult situations and who want institutional support for rehabilitation so that they can live their lives with dignity.

To meet the basic needs of shelter, food, clothing, medical care, and care for the women in need who lack any social or economic support, Swadhar Grehs will be established in every district, each of which will have a capacity for 30 women.

The Ujjawala Scheme was introduced by the Ministry of Women and Child Development to stop the trafficking of women and children for the purpose of commercial sexual exploitation. It does this by engaging local communities in awareness-raising campaigns, workshops and seminars, and other similar events.

It also strives to give victims both short and long-term rehabilitation services by meeting their fundamental needs for things like housing, food, clothes, medical care, including counseling, legal advice and guidance, and job training.
